
# Parents: Gifted and Talented



### What is Giftedness? (Wisconsin DPI)

The concept of giftedness has varied over the course of educational, philosophical, and psychological history. Educational approaches to meeting the needs of students with gifts and talents have been based on our understanding of giftedness, so they have varied as our conceptualizations have shifted. We now accept that intelligence is not a single entity, but multifaceted. Guidelines for developing gifted education plans in Wisconsin are anchored in this broad notion of gifts and talents in several areas:

- Intellectual ability
- Academic Ability
- Creative Ability
- Artistic Ability
- Leadership

# **Frequently Asked Questions**

#### Who do I talk to if my child is talented and has not been identified?

Parents should initially contact the classroom teacher with questions regarding talent identification, differentiation and possible next steps. The teacher will then consult with the Gifted and Talented coordinator (G/T). If additional assessments are warranted, parents will be contacted. The G/T coordinator and/or school counselor will arrange for the appropriate assessment to identify student needs. The results of testing regarding formal identification will be communicated to parents.

#### When should I talk to the classroom teacher?

Anytime, is a good time to contact your child's teacher concerning their educational needs. While spring or falls are optimum times to assess students, you may also call or e: mail anytime to schedule a meeting with the classroom teacher. In addition you are always welcome to visit your child's classroom.

#### How will I know if my child has been identified for Gifted and Talented support?

Parents play a central role in the identification process and will be included throughout the evaluation and educational plan

#### What does it mean to differentiate instruction?

Students come to school with a variety of leaning needs and a wide range of interests. Differentiating instruction means that a teacher recognizes those academic differences and modifies classroom instruction in order to help each child reach his or her academic potential.

#### How will I know if my child is receiving differentiated opportunities?

Differentiation is designed to occur in all subjects in grades 3-8 with additionally opportunities at the high school level. In many cases, a child may not be aware that adaptations have been made to meet his or her needs. Parents are encouraged to ask their child and/or teacher about assignments, groupings, projects and opportunities in the classroom

How will I receive on-going information about my child's progress and support opportunities? Communication among parents, students and teachers is essential for parents to learn about supporting opportunities. Parents should contact the classroom teacher or G/T coordinator with any questions or concerns. Additionally, parent/teacher conferences are a good time to receive an update on your child's progress.

#### How do I best prepare for meaningful parent/teacher conferences?

The following questions for teachers may help you obtain more in-depth information about your child.

- 1. What do you see as my child's strengths and weaknesses?
- 2. If my child has a great deal of prior knowledge concerning a unit/theme, is there a way they can be given other options to broaden their knowledge base? Is it possible for them to move ahead to more complex subject matter or other opportunities?
- 3. How can I help my child at home?

#### **Midwest Academic Talent Search / Summer**

The Midwest Academic Talent Search (MATS) is part of a national program for identifying talented students by administering out-of-level tests such as the SAT I, ACT, and ACT-EXPLORE. WCATY works with the Northwestern University Center for Talent Development (CTD) to offer this program to Wisconsin students ingrades 4-9 who have already attained scores at or above the 95<sup>th</sup> percentile (and 3<sup>rd</sup> graders in the 97<sup>th</sup> percentile) on standardized achievement tests. Students who participate in MATS also have their test results entered into WCATY's database and are notified of programs for which they are eligible to participate.
